Integrity is the cornerstone of good character. It is the quality of being honest, having consistently high moral standards, and the actions to match those principles. “Integrity” comes from the word “integer,” which means “one” or “wholeness.” This means that there should be no divisions in an ethical person’s life—no differences in how decisions are made from situation to situation, and no difference in the way one acts at work, at home, in public, or alone. Without Integrity, an individual will fall short of realizing his or her full potential. A person of Integrity is truthful, sincere, fair, and has the desire and the courage to do what is right.

Every day our own character is challenged by the situations we face, and our actions or our decisions in handling these circumstances reveal our Integrity. In the Stephen Covey book, First Things First, he talks about the MOMENT OF CHOICE or the moment of truth, and how Integrity has to fit quickly between a stimulus and a response. In this short pause, an individual has to think about the position he will take. With a good character base, we increase our ability to act quickly with Integrity and courage. It is easy to think of courage in connection with a very dramatic event like running into a burning house to save a child. But some great acts of everyday courage are found in this pause between stimulus and response in our everyday decisions in life, in which we must decide to act with Integrity. It takes courage to stop transmitting negative tendencies and to choose to act on principles of human dignity and respect. It takes courage to be self-honest, to examine your motives, to live with Integrity and let go of excuses. It takes courage to make choices that may not be popular or understood by others but that keep your Integrity whole. It takes courage to live with Integrity rather than to live with your moods. The challenge is to develop the character necessary to

act with Integrity and courage in this **MOMENT OF CHOICE.**

Parents are the primary moral educators of children, but character education in the schools is also important. Research has proven character education to be a positive force in reducing disruptive behavior, alcohol and drug abuse, and teen pregnancy. Character education contributes to parental and community involvement, safe and orderly schools, reduced discipline problems, greater academic achievement, and higher student and staff morale.

What is Integrity?

How do you practice Integrity?

- Always do what is right even if it is costly and difficult.
- Don’t compromise good morals by giving in to temptations.
- Be honest to yourself and to others.
- Practice and role model good character.
- Refuse to listen to negative talk or gossip about others.
- Tell the truth and be trustworthy.
- Keep all of your promises.
- Judge a person on an individual level, rather than a group level.
- Admit it when you make mistakes and learn from them.
