Activity 1: How much Education is needed? – Game

EQ- 1. What are the career opportunities in the early childhood field?

- 1) Before class, write different child care careers on individual slips of paper. If you laminate them you'll be able to use them for a longer period of time.
- 2) Make and post one sign in each corner of the room indicating different educational levels (high school diploma, two-year college degree, four year college degree, graduate degree).
- 3) Hand each student the name of a career as he or she enters the classroom.
- **4)** Ask students to move to the level of education they think is needed to qualify for their assigned career.
- 5) One group at a time have each student name their job and what type of work they "think" is involved.
- **6)** Let them know if they're in the wrong group and ask them to move, but don't tell them which group they should join.
- 7) Go through each group and briefly discuss the jobs and possibly some of the requirements.
- **8)** You'll notice that many students have no idea there are SOOOO many jobs related to child care. These are just a few.

Students will be able to discuss the child care career levels - including responsibilities, demands, and, rewards for each level.

As the demand for child care increases due to the social and economic changes in our society, opportunities for a career in early childhood care have increased. There has never been a greater demand for child care. All of this has lead to a variety of career opportunities. There are NUMBEROUS child care related jobs and you may want to include more from the previous activity:

- Nannies- provides care in a child's home
- Au Pairs- person who lives with a family and performs tasks similar to those of a nanny
- Directors of child care facilities-person over a for-profit or non-profit day care
- Family child care providers-keep children in their home
- Lead teachers-in charge of planning activities and care of children in classroom
- Assistant teachers-assists lead teachers in the care of the children
- Child care resources and referral specialists-person who provides resources for day care centers and refers parents to quality child care facilities
- **Licensing specialists**-works for state and observes whether or not day care centers are following state licensing guidelines
- Child care entrepreneur-creates and runs his or her own business such as a family day care.

How to Look for a Job

Step1

Go to career fairs. Attending career fairs is a great investment of time and effort during the job search because you can directly approach a great number of employers in a day. You can send out resumes to hiring staffs, instead of having to complete applications one by one. Hiring managers also attend these fairs, so you could personally meet the one responsible for hiring you.

Step2

Research employment websites online. More and more employers are posting employment opportunities on-line, so be sure to visit sites like Monster.com, Career Builder and Yahoo Hot Jobs to find a job.

Step3

Network, network, network. Never underestimate the power of networking. Tell your friends and family that you are looking for a job. They may know of some openings at their workplaces, or can partner you with someone they know who is looking to hire an employee with your skills.

Step4

Utilize your resources. Be resourceful during the job search. Sure, the <u>Internet</u> makes it easier to contact employers, but you also have other resources such as newspapers and magazines. Look for jobs the traditional way, perusing classified ads printed in the newspapers. Another "old time way" is to look in the yellow pages and call day care centers and ask if they are hiring and make an appointment for an interview.
